

It further appearing that after diligent search, inquiry and investigation it cannot be ascertained and it is not known whether the persons named in said Bill of Complaint as defendants, or any of them, are living or dead or where he, she or they may reside if living, except Howard M. Warner and Harley D. Warner, Trustees of the Estate of Fred M.
