EDITORIAL

WHILE THE IRON IS HOT

Suddenly, and with an element of surprise, two major steps in the history of Greater Grand River were taken last week. The state administrative board, without solicitation, took notice of the wretched conditions existing along the highway between Farmington and Redford. At almost the same time, Detroit officials announced an express street car service to Redford.

Both of these developments of importance took place without active effort on the part of citizens of this section, although a great deal of work along the same lines had previously been expended without result. Many had, in fact, come to believe that any attempt to achieve further widening of Grand River and better transportation service would be a waste of time and effort.

Now however, the State and the City of Detroit have both recognized the importance of developing the Grand River section. And now is the time for organized effort on the part of all the citizens and business men of Farmington—the psychological moment to work for the improvement of highway and transportation conditions all the way to Farmington. The officials both in Lansing and at Detroit undoubtedly have the Grand River situation fresh in their minds. Their familiarity with conditions at this moment would lighten the task of workers for further improvement.

The Farmington Exchange club has made a splendid beginning by taking steps to ascertain whether the City of Detroit would consider extending trolley service to Farmington. But nothing has yet been done about the still more important aspect, widening of the highway. The State's action will extend the 40-foot pavement only a little more than half a mile.

Primitive man learned that if he wished to bend metal to the shape he desired, he must "strike while the iron is hot." This ancient adage applies to the Grand River section today with unusual force. The opportunity has been placed in Farmington's hands. It is hoped that it will not pass unnoticed or neglected.

HELP REDUCE FIRE LOSSES

Fire Prevention Week is to be held this year from October 9 to 15. Throughout the country various organizations will again attempt to train the public in offsetting the greatest menace in the United States today. Our people will do well to learn, and profit by example.

The tragedy of fire is that it is almost entirely preventable. There are, of course, natural causes for conflagrations that cannot be helped, but these are a very small percentage of the total. The greatest damage is caused by carelessness and ignorance. Billions of dollars are wasted and destroyed each year by a few people's carelessness. It would not be so reprehensible if the loss were borne by them alone. But it must be shared, directly or in-

directly, by every citizen and taxpayer.

It is the duty of every citizen to co-operate in the observation of Fire Prevention Week. And it should be his pleasure. Fire loss can be stopped. And in a single week, if everyone will observe and learn, a great deal can be accomplished in the way of reducing it—Manufacturer.
