EDITORIAL

**WE APPROVE—LET US ALSO
 ACT**

Every business-man and every resident of the Grand River section should make it his business to follow closely developments in the effort of the Farmington Exchange club to secure a reinstatement of trolley car service from Detroit to Farmington. Every citizen who is at all interested in the progress of the community must do his part in this work that means so much to the community.

Next Wednesday, Del A. Smith, manager of the Department of Street Railways for the D. S. R. is to visit Farmington and speak at the meeting of the Exchange club. The securing of Mr. Smith's promise to come to Farmington and talk on the subject, and undoubtedly to consider it seriously as a matter for action in the near future, a beginning as encouraging as could be hoped for. It remains now for Farmington to make the most of its good fortune.

It is important that every signature that can possibly be obtained be attached to the petitions which are to be sent around in the next few days. A request bearing the unanimous approval of the city's residents and business-men cannot but impress Detroit officials.

Unfortunately, every city finds many proposals for progress upon which its leading citizens have difficulty in uniting whole-heartedly. Farmington has its difficulties in this respect as have other communities. But a project in regard to which there is such universal accord as this movement for trolley service, must not be allowed to fail for lack of intelligent, concerted, active effort.

 Carelessness causes most fires. Every fifteen minutes someone's home catches fire.
 Fifteen thousand burn to death each year in America.
 Help prevent fire. Be careful!
 The above are statements issued by the State fire marshal, and represent the reason for designating October 9 to 15 Fire Prevention Week.
 As the days grow colder, and fires are necessary in stoves, fireplaces and furnaces for comfort, the danger of losses increases. It is important, therefore, that flues should be examined, cleaned, and repaired where necessary.
 Not all losses of property and lives, by any means, are caused by defective flues. A frequent source of danger is rubbish collected in basements or in and around buildings. A general cleanup is an effective method of fire prevention.
