NEW INTERLOCKER IN OPERATION AT WIXOM CROSSING

Train Stops Made Unnecessary By Installation; Officials Watch Tests

The new interlocker which has been installed at the Pere Marquette-Grand Trunk railroad crossing at Wixom was put into operation for the first time Wednesday morning. A Marquette official visited Wixom to witness the first operation of the system, and the final tests.

The interlocker will make unnecessary the safety stops which trains of both railroads have been forced to make at Wixom. It was installed by Pere Marquette workmen.

In response to inquiry regarding the possibility of placing safety devices at the crossings, the railroad men said that the Public Utilities Commission would almost certainly refuse permission to the railroads to install gates, which are considered unsafe. If necessity for safety devices is apparent, it is likely that flashing lights would be installed over the crossings.

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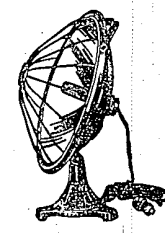

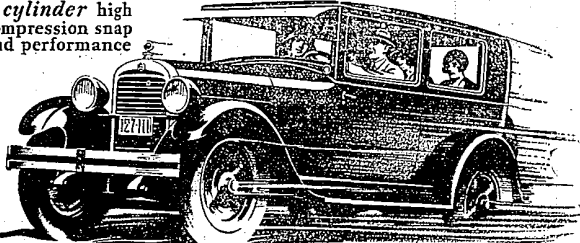
