NEW RECREATION CENTER IN FARMINGTON TO BE OPENED WEDNESDAY

A new recreation center for all in this section interested in bowling, will be opened next Wednesday evening, October 26. It is located at 201 Division street, opposite the end of State street.

The bowling alleys in the building have been sanded down and re-finished, and the entire interior of the structure renovated.

Desirable surroundings that are in keeping with the highest standards are assured by J. Morrow, who has leased the building and will be permanently located there.

Bowling leagues for men and women will be organized, and tournaments arranged, as soon as the season is under way.
