

STATE LIPTS BAN ON FOX-SQUIRREL HUNTING FOR ONE WEEK ONLY

Hunters, rejoice. The four-year ban that was to have been in effect on fox-squirrel hunting will be thoroughly and completely removed for one full week this fall. The dates being from next Tuesday, October 25, to October 31.

The digests of game laws for 1927-28, issued some time ago, carried notice of the prohibiting of all squirrel hunting until October 25, 1932. On Thursday, however, Emory Hatton received cards with notice of the permission to hunt fox-squirrel. Other game is listed on the cards, from which denote everything that may be hunted this season. The fox-squirrel is most important to hunters of this section.

BIRMINGHAM PLANS 'PROSPERITY WEEK' DURING NOVEMBER

Village Invites Neighboring Communities To Join In Thanksgiving

The village of Birmingham will observe one entire week of thanks giving this November to acknowledge and exhibit the good fortune with which the towns and villages of Oakland County have been favored during the past year. H. T. Ellerby, president of the village, has called upon the community to celebrate a Prosperity Week, with the date tentatively set for November 14 to 20, to co-incide with the opening of the Kunsky Theatre and precede the formal opening of the new Baldwin Public Library.

"Towns like Farmington and Birmingham have been, unusually fortunate this year," said Mr. Ellerby in explaining his plans to the Enterprise. "They have come through a year of general trade dullness with colors flying; and they should be grateful for the prosperity which they have retained. Now that the financial situation is better I believe that it only needs a thankful and optimistic psychology to make statewide prosperity certain."

The program for the week will be in charge of Charles Shain and L. M. Colgrove and will begin with a meeting in the Baldwin High School on Monday evening at which Girl Scouts will usher and with an address by some one high in political life of the state.

Tuesday night there will be window shopping with all merchants' windows gayly decorated and lighted, a band concert and street dance, and refreshments served at the Community House. Wednesday night is set apart for the opening of new theatre. Thursday night an automobile parade, a firemen's demonstration and club exhibitions will be the features, and Friday there will be an exhibit of the work of school children in the high school. The week will close with a union service on Sunday in the Kunsky Theatre.

STORING BUTTER FOR WINTER USE IS FOUND PRACTICABLE ON FARMS

If the summer supply of butter in the farm home is larger than is used by the family and the winter supply is less than is desirable, it is sometimes convenient to store the summer surplus for use in winter. To insure good keeping qualities in butter the United States Department of Agriculture has found it best to use Pasteurized sweet cream. The cream should be churned at a low temperature and the butter washed so that it will be firm and waxy.

Rolls of print of butter should be wrapped in parchment paper, placed in a stone-crock, and covered with strong brine. This preserves the butter much better than packing it firmly in a crock and covering the surface merely with paper or with dry salt or paraffin. Brine storage is much preferable to paraffin coating, packing in dry salt, or parchment paper covering of the storage crock. Butter should be stored in as cool a place as is available and in a place free from odors likely to be absorbed by the butter.
