The story points out a new way to get to Congress—going to jail first—which creates some unusual comedy situations.

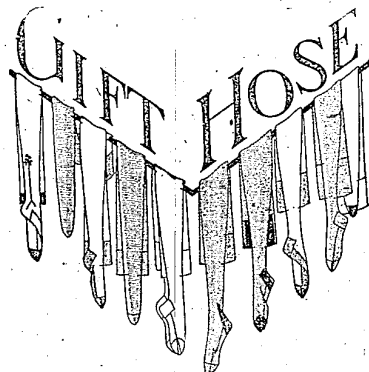


### SAFE DRIVING REQUIRED

It is the careless driver that makes railroad grade crossings dangerous. Whenever a grade crossing accident occurs the public has a habit of considering the crossing instead of the driver. Nearly every grade crossing accident is preventable. Careful driving would eliminate this hazard entirely. The automobile is what we must think about, not the crossings. Ninety per cent of all auto accidents occur on

highways. Not over 10 per cent occur at grade crossings. Separation of grade crossings would entail a heavy burden on the taxpayers, while leaving 90 per cent of the hazards of automobile accidents uncared for. Safe driving costs nothing, yet it would remove the hazards of driving, not only at grade crossings, but on the highways as well.

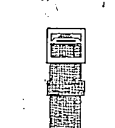
