The width of 120 feet, which will obtain east of the Junction. Commissioner Rogers stated that the Administrative Board would undoubtedly be willing to make the road either 120 feet or 100 feet wide in Farmington, leaving the question to the people of Farmington, providing there would be little or no difference in the amount of dedications that could be secured. He stated to this newspaper, however, that it was his opinion that "120 feet probably would be better in the long run."

Impressed with the necessity for quick action, Mayor Butterfield expects to call a special meeting of the city commission within a few days to "crystallize the work done so far, and carry forward without delay the city's part of the work. With delegations from all over the State asking the Administrative Board for roads, Farmington's chances are believed to lie wholly in reaching Lansing—with facts and figures before the end of this month.
