Cancer Services 'Not For Sale'

FARMINGTON Hospital equipment isn't the usual thing one borrows from a neighbor. But a neighbor who loans hospital equipment is Mrs. Frank Lohm of Farmington who works with the Michigan Cancer Foundation.

She recently lent Mrs. Charles F. of Farmington a free hospital bed, wheelchair and commode valued at \$410.

MRS. F. had called the Foundation's South Oakland unit office at 1239 Coolidge, Berkeley, because she couldn't afford to rent the equipment.

needed for the home care of her husband, a cancer patient. "Luckily, this woman had heard about our free equipment loan service through her husband's physician," explains Mrs. Lohm.

"But many patients and their families are unaware that we lend hospital equipment free of charge. They're buying or renting this equipment at costs they can hardly afford."

THE PATIENT services program seeks to make patients living with cancer comfortable in their homes, she adds, and this involves working with emotional and financial problems as well as with purely medical ones.

Many emotional and financial problems can be solved, Mrs. Lohm adds, before the patient leaves the hospital.

The Foundation offers free medical supplies to indigent patients whose incomes, while large enough to provide necessities of life, are not sufficient to cover their medical costs.

Requirements for

assistance are genuine need and approval of the patient's physician. Foundation volunteer drivers will transport cancer patients who have no other means of reaching medical treatment centers.

As part of the Cancer Control Month during April, the Foundation is using a "Not For Sale" campaign to remind the public that all of its services are available without charge.

A Chance To Learn
An investment of four consecutive Wednesday evenings could answer some questions of parents about the family life and human relations course being introduced into the Farmington Schools curriculum this fall.

Designed chiefly for parents of elementary age children, the family life class will be taught in Farmington High School, Room 108E for a \$4 fee.

The class begins April 21, and is sponsored by Farmington's adult education department. Emphasis throughout the sessions is on

the parent's role and the need for a strong family unit. Such classes have been available periodically ever since the concept of some type of family relations study was introduced in the district back in 1965. Gerald V. Harrison, then supt. of schools, worked with Dr. Armin Grams of the Merrill Palmer Institute to produce a program which would afford parents an opportunity to influence the direction the subject should take in future curricula.
