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EXCESS LAND LAW IS UNCONSTITUTIONAL Act No: 351 of the Public Acts of 1925, governing the method of acquiring land for widening and extending state lighways, securi-ed by the Groesbeck administra-tion and considered one of lits principal achievements, has been declared unconstitutional by the Michigan Supreme Court. State Highway Rogers is reported to have (ax-pressed the opinion that the deci-sion of the court would delay the work on the Wider Woodward avenue project, as condemnation will have to proceed under the basic law which gives the land-holder the right of a trial by jury. It may also, it was said, inter-fere seriously with the transac-tion whereby the state agreed to give to the Grand Trunk railway a new right-of-way in exchange for its trackage paralleling Wood-ward avenue from Royal Oak to Pontiac. In this case the state's only method of keeping its agree-ment would be by condemnation by jury as provided by the consti-tution of the United States and of the state of Michigan. The court's action in no way uestioned the right of the state to condemn properly for such im-provements, but ruled that the method was conficatory and vio-lated the constitutional rights of the land-owner. The Farmington township board has adopted a master plan of street layout for the entire town-ship, in order to avoid confusion and conflict in the future subdi-viding of, properties. The plan was prepared by the George H. Ruhling company, closulting en-gineers of Detroit. Thirty-six sectional maps make up the plan, and on these maps are shown a master street plan to which all future subdivisions or properly must conform. The width and quarter section line roads are shown, together with the location of all future intersecting streets.
