OAKLAND POULTRY SCHOOL AT NEW HUDSON
The general interest in the poultry schools held at Holly and New Hudson next week indicates that the attendance will be large from all sections of the county. The school at Holly will be held in the council rooms on January 25 and 26 and the school at New Hudson will be in the high school on January 27 and 28. Each session will start promptly at 10:00 a. m. and close promptly at 3:00 p. m. with J. M. Moore, well known poultry specialist in charge.

Oakland county is the only county in eastern Michigan where more than one school is being given. It has been possible to secure two schools for Oakland only because of the wide spread interest in poultry here.

The lessons are so arranged that each half day is devoted to a special subject such as feeding, housing and the like. Emphasis is placed upon the subjects relating to the care of baby chicks in an effort to help prevent the extremely heavy losses which some poultrymen have suffered in past seasons.

Some men who have unusual success with baby chicks will be able to contribute considerable information to others. Walter Andrews of Holly, using the Wisconsin ration and the recommended Michigan system of brooding, was one hundred per cent successful in raising all the chicks hatched from eggs shipped from Oregon last season.

Some of the material used will be presented in printed form but each one is asked to provide himself with notebook and pencil. The school will be conducted in the same manner as the short course at the college and is open to all poultrymen.

EVERYONE'S HELP IS NEEDED

There is a corn sugar bill before congress. This bill was first introduced by the name of the "Cole Bill" and has now received the common name of "Corn Sugar Bill." It has a provision, stating that corn sugar be allowed to be put in with other sweets and the adulteration not marked on the label.

As it now stands we have a pure food law which says that if a food is adulterated, it must be stated so on the label in a conspicuous part. The "Cole Bill," wishes to remove, in a way, the Pure Food Law.

I am interested in honey and the production of a pure product, the same as our other beekeeper friends. The "Cole Bill," if passed will allow the adulteration of honey with corn sugar or corn syrup and not make note of it on the label.

People want to know what they are paying for. If you do, please write now to your two Michigan senators, at Washington, D. C., requesting them to not pass the "Corn Sugar Bill."

They want to serve their people whom they represent. Michigan senators are Ferris and Couzens.
