Only Child in Family

Not Under Handicap

What are the factors that make a man a success or a failure? On this question, which perhaps interests us all more than any other, science of late has been altering our opinions radically, says Popular Science Monthly. A long-prevalent idea has been that the only child in a family suffers a decided handicap as far as success is concerned. And so we have been accustomed to pity the pampered youngster who grows up without the companionship of brothers and sisters.

Now comes John C. Stuart, psychologist at Colgate university, to upset this notion. From laboratory tests he concludes that the only child gets out into the world with as good a chance of success as a child with many brothers and sisters. This investigator, in the tests, examined 465 students representing families of different sizes. Eighty-one of them were "only children," 124 were from families with two children, and five had nine brothers and sisters each.

Students were asked to solve puzzles, complete sentences and do a wide variety of mental tasks as quickly as possible. The results revealed that the students who showed the greatest speed on one test also excelled in most of the others.

Name Changes Among Jews

The Jewish aptitude for a change of surname is reported to be manifesting itself in Palestine, where many of the Zionist settlers are adopting the new Hebrew designation "Mizrahi," meaning Easterner, says the Manchester Guardian. Once upon a time a whole great Jewish community was compelled to make such a change of name by law. After the Prussian War of Liberation in 1813, an edict was issued ordering all Jews within the Prussian realm to Teutonize their surnames. Most of those affected chose new designations from nature and originated the tribes of Rosenstein, Rosenberg, Blumenstein, and so forth.

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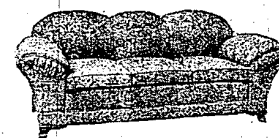
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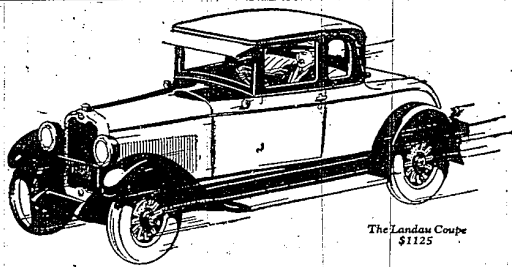
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
