Mrs. Wilson is the new music teacher at the school in place of Miss Friers.

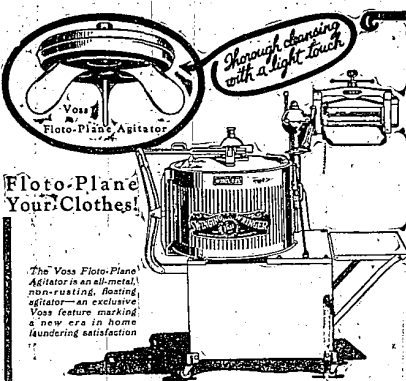
Fred Dare, who was ill for some time, is able to be out again.

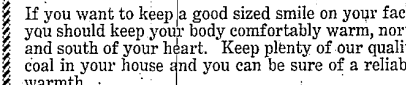
Election of officers will take place and reports will be given. An interesting program of recollections of former days and old time violin selections has been arranged by the officers of the organization.
