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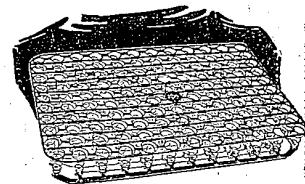

WOMAN WINS \$10,000 IN HUSBAND'S DEATH

Damages of \$10,000 were awarded Mrs. Minnie S. Brydon, of Farmington, plaintiff in a \$25,000 suit against Alfred Scovel, 5912 Grand River avenue, in a verdict by a jury in Judge Miller's court in Detroit, this week.

Mrs. Brydon sought damages for the death of her husband, Joseph A. Brydon, who died October 13, 1922, two days after an automobile accident in which he was pinned under his own overturned car after it had been struck by the machine driven by Scovel. Brydon, who was 38 years old at the time, was employed as a maintenance man with the Otis Cement Construction Co.

Scovel was driving east on Grand River avenue, about 1,500 feet west of the Seven-Mile road, when he struck the rear end of a wrecking car, and was thrown to the left, directly in the path of the Brydon machine. The force of the impact was so great that the Brydon car overturned.

Mrs. Brydon has one child, Lucille, 10 years old.



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
