# MARCH MEETINGS FARMINGTON P. S. ASSN. HIGHWAY ROUTE . UNDER SURVEY

Proposed Northwestern Road To Be Important Trunk

A survey to determine the best location for the route of the 204-foot Northwestern highway, both east and west of the point where it will cross the Rouge River and Telegraph road on a proposed unique doubledeck bridge, is to start at once. This was the announcement last week of G. Ross Thompson, chairman of the Oakland board of county road commissioners, at a hearing in the board's Pontiac offices attended by representatives of the Southfield Park Improvement Association, and other Detroit and Oakland county men interested in the improvement of this super-highway.

Condemnation of whatever land is needed for the 204-foot right-of-way, after all dedications are filed, will be rushed. Mr. Thompson said, to permit construction of pavement to start this year on the part of. Northwestern highway, which pierces the Southfield Park district. This three-mile stretch between the Eight Mile road and the Ten and One-half Mile road, has been dedicated 204 feet wide by the members of the Southfield Park Association. Dedications all are on file with the commission.

Northwestern highway which is parallel to, and midway between Woodward and Grand River avenues is being made 204 feet wide in Wayne county, also, from a point on Wyoming avenue just north of Fenkell avenue to the Oakland county line at Eight Mile and Division roads, a distance of four miles, it is said.
