Yet to recognize slogans at their true worth and to cease employing them after they have been worn out is a sign of rather high intelligence. The British coal miners fought their strike on the slogan basis: "Not a penny off the pay, not a minute on the day." Now they are about to begin negotiations for a settlement, which the carrying out of this slogan would make impossible. So they simply dropped it. That is what they think of the tyranny of words. —Philadelphia Public Ledger.
