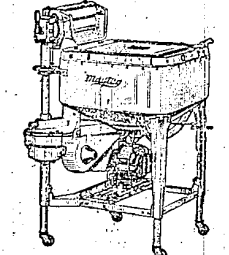

Botanists in Error
About Coconut Palm?
Fossil nuts discovered at Mangoni, New Zealand, indicate that the coconut palm flourished there possibly as early as 1,000,000 years ago, according to Prof. Edward W. Berry of Johns Hopkins university.
There have been two opinions among botanists as to the place of origin and the method of distribution of the coconut palm. Alphonse De Candolle and other botanists have held that its place of origin was Asia or Polynesia, and that nuts carried by the ocean currents and tossed ashore by the waves spread the palm from land to land. On the other hand, James Cook collected and published abundant and convincing evidence of its South American origin and its inability to establish or maintain itself in any location without the assistance of man.
Professor Berry identifies the deposits in which these fossils were discovered as pliocene or pre-pliocene in age. This would indicate that these coconuts were growing wild, as there is no evidence in that remote age of men who might have cultivated them.

First Centennial Tree
The first centennial tree, planted fifty years ago, is reported to the American Tree association by J. E. Scallan of Waucoma, Iowa. He planted another centennial tree, as his father did in 1876, just as the nation's sesquicentennial was being celebrated. Scallan has registered this tree on the association's honor roll at Washington. What will this tree look like in 1976 or 2076? Cumberland naturalists connect their arrival with the presence of greenfly, which has been prevalent throughout the summer, causing much damage in gardens and orchards.

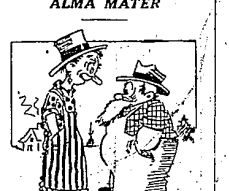
Go to School in Boats
