like to have all materials and films planned for use in the sex education curriculum available at each school for public and parental viewing "so they could see what we are planning to show and what the committee claims will be shown and they are two different things."

"I have tried diligently to do what I thought was right and will continue to do so as long as I am a representative of the public," Emmitt declared. "It is unfortunate so many controversial issues had to be brought to focus at this particular time, but I don't believe any board would have operated much differently than we have."

REV. HUGH STEWART, pastor of St. Stephen Presbyterian Church who chaired the Family Life education committee, said bluntly: "I hope it (the recall petition drive) fails. If it actually goes on the ballot, I am convinced the community will support the board." "I have every confidence in the competency of our board to make decisions on curriculum and decisions affecting the good and future of our school," he added. "I am pleased at the decision they made (in approving sex education)." Dr. Murray Deighton, chairman of the FLE's sex education task force said the recall effort "kind of tragic."

"Basically we are all after the same kind of goal," Dr. Deighton said. "They are concerned about schools demoralizing young people and bad influences on our young. These things the committee had in mind. We attempted to give a positive view of family life, and these folks behave like they're against sex."

"I have respect and admiration for the whole board," Dr. Deighton asserted. "They are all fine people doing a somewhat thankless job." Mrs. Phyllis Cummings, president of the Farmington Council of PTAs which supported the FLE guidelines, said her executive board "hopefully" will be meeting within the next few days and "very possibly may have a statement then" regarding the recall attempt.

She declined to comment personally saying any statement might be regarded as an official PTA position and "I need the backing of the council."
