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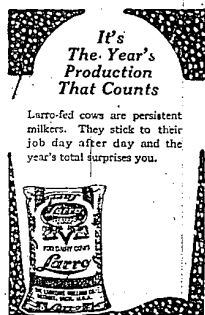

Mixed Blood Common in Hawaiian Islands

Intercast marriage among people from at least five different strains are common in Hawaii. "From the standpoint of numbers and variety of mixture, Hawaii is one of the best places in the world for a scientific study of the biological effects of race mixture," says Romanzo Adams in a report to the Hawaiian Academy of Science. About 13,000 Caucasian-Hawaiians and 8,000 Asiatic-Hawaiians comprise 7 per cent of the total population, he says. The Chinese have been making small contributions to the general mixture for a generation, but now the Japanese have begun to marry out of their own race in large numbers. More than 44 per cent of the men of American and North European ancestry, according to data collected by Mr. Adams, marry women of other races, while the Portuguese and Filipinos follow suit. The general use of the English language and the steady building up of common manners and customs, together with "movies" and autos, are thought to be contributing factors to the growing amalgamation. Hawaii has no law against inter-racial marriages and little or no discrimination against the offspring of mixed ancestry. Consequently the opportunities for scientific observation of the laws of heredity as applied to individuals of mixed race are peculiarly favorable.
