They have representatives in both houses of the legislature and are entitled to a hearing. But for asinine pettiness on the part of four little senators who loom big in their own conceit, the real sentiment of the legislature would ere this, have been expressed.

These little senators have a perfect right to their opinion, and should vote on the question accordingly. Were they broad minded men an inherrent sense of decemy would have precluded the possibility of any such jackass performance as has characterized their actions.
