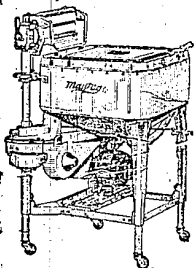

COMMISSIONERS PROCEEDINGS

Meeting of the Commissioners of the City of Farmington, held March 26, 1927. Called to order by Mayor Butterfield at 7:33 p. m. Commissioners present: Johnson, Gildemeister, Hogle, Hatton and Russell.

Minutes of the last meeting read and approved.

Moved by Hogle, supported by Gildemeister, that the resignation of Commissioner Cook, effective March 31, be accepted. Carried all yeas.

Commissioner Hatton reported that the fire siren had been installed and was subject to inspection and approved by the Commission.

Mayor Butterfield made the following recommendation on the Hatton-Dickerson sewer construction on the Villa Vista subdivision.

March 26, 1927.
To the City Commission.
Gentlemen:

The close of the present administrative period being near at hand I consider it our duty to dispose, so far as possible, of all items of unfinished business. This is but just to ourselves and to the succeeding administration and I request that you will act with that end in view.

In this connection there is one matter of some magnitude to which I wish to especially direct your attention. I refer to communication and statement from Hatton & Dickerson, owners of Villa Vista Gardens subdivision in the S. W. part of the city.

This was first submitted to the Commission on or about October 14, 1926 and solicited the payment to them by the city of \$1975.00 on account of using larger sewer crock than was contemplated at the time of accepting their plat.

Here permit me to call attention to the facts in the matter.

The larger sewer crock were used without the authority or knowledge of the Commission it being first brought to their attention some time after the work was done.

The superintendent of public works states that when consulted in the matter he agreed that the larger crock were desirable but thought the Commission should be consulted first.

The account was not acted upon, but it came up again February 21, 1927 and a committee was authorized by the Commission to report on the situation in detail.

The committee has made no report and I consider it proper at this time to cite for your consideration certain sections of the city charter as follows: Sec. 17, Page 35, Sec. 8 Page 43.

Particularly note the first reference.

Therefore I consider any action looking to the payment of this item illegal and recommend that it be not paid.
