ARMSTRONG-CHIEF OF STATE BUREAU

Lieut. Fred G. Armstrong has been made chief of the detective bureau of the State Police. Lyle Morse, fingerprint expert has been made assistant chief.

The secret service division, or detective bureau, has established a special bank squad to follow up safe-blowing reports. It is the intention to give assistance to local authorities by collecting information on all crimes of this sort in the state and thus eliminate together clues which would not be available to local officers dealing only with one isolated case. Results have already been obtained in one case where a gang committed a number of jobs in small towns and the various individual clues obtained in different cases were finally worked together to form a complete case.

TROOPER-SLAYER TAKEN

Pennsylvania State Police again have upheld a tradition of the force that a man who kills a State Police officer never escapes.

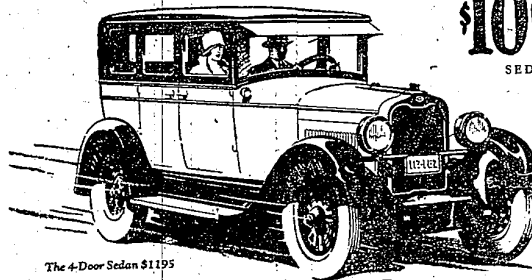
