London Call Sells Buick



WHAT is believed to be the first retail automobile sale ever made by international telephone was closed recently by the Garber Buick Company when A. F. Penoyer, salesman, sold a car to a prospect in London by telephone from Saginaw, Michigan.

The purchaser of the car is R. C. Morley of Morley Brothers Wholesale Hardware Company, who was in England on a business trip at the time. Penoyer, an enterprising salesman, learned that the head of the Morley concern was to talk from London to the directors of his company at a certain hour, and he

made arrangements to be on hand. "Hello, Mr. Morley," said Penoyer. "It seems good to hear your voice, even though you are a long way from home. I understand you are going to sail tomorrow. Before you left we tried to get your approval on one of our new Buick Country Club coupes. I would like to have one of these cars trimmed and equipped for you when you arrive home."

After a short discussion of terms, Morley gave the order for the car. He then talked for a moment with Guy Garber, Buick distributor in Saginaw.

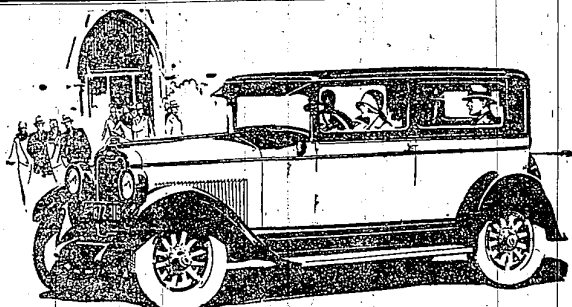
