Referring to the "Correction" as published on page 8 of last week's Farmington Enterprise

State of Michigan, County of Oakland, ss:
Wells D. Butterfield, being duly sworn, makes the following statement:
That he did not assist in writing, publishing, or paying for the advertisement that appeared in the Farmington Enterprise of March 31, 1927, and paid for by his friends. That he did not know the identity of these friends, until sometime later.
That he did pay for one hundred copies of that issue of the Enterprise, but paid nothing for their distribution, as such distribution was later considered unnecessary. That he did pay for distributing other literature.
That he considers the statement of his friends that "about 50 per cent of the taxes was used to pay the indebtedness accumulated in previous years" is not an exaggeration and was not a reflection on any preceding year or administration.
That the following data, furnished by the City Clerk and printed in the Enterprise of March 17, 1927, for the most part represents payments on accumulated debts:

Notes	\$6,000
Interest on bonds	\$3,000
Payments of Bonds	\$4,000
Sinking Fund	\$2,000
Township Overdraft	\$3,000
Total	\$18,000

That the annual budget as fixed May 25, 1926 was \$34,544.25.

That this data shows that about 50 per cent of last year's budget was applied on accumulated indebtedness of years previous, leaving only about 50% of last year's budget for last year's operations.
