

TUBERCULOSIS CLINIC

WILL BE CONTINUED

The Oakland County Tuberculosis Association will continue with the Diagnostic clinics during the month of May. The plan of the association this year is to hold chest clinics in the larger towns or centers of the County.

On Thursday, May 12, 9 to 12 a. m., at Central school, residents of Clarencville and surrounding community are invited to attend this clinic. Dr. E. R. VanderSlie of Lansing, who is a specialist in lung diseases and a man of wide experience in this type of work, will be the clinician.

Some of the important symptoms that a physician should be consulted about are: a tired feeling that you cannot account for; a cough that you cannot get rid of; a marked loss in weight; an afternoon temperature; contact

with tuberculosis in your home. A copy of the findings will be sent to the family physician. Ruby Rogers, Oakland County nurse, will have charge of the clinic. Zelpha B. Hale, executive secretary will be in attendance and assist with the clinic routine. These clinics are financed from the sale of tuberculosis Christmas seals and are one of the important projects of the prevention-of-disease educational program adopted by the association.


