FIND BORERS RUINED CANADIAN CORN CROP
The need for the clean-up campaign now being waged in the corn borer infested area was vividly shown to a group of farmers who visited Essex County, Ontario, recently.

Accompanied by Iru Graham, President of the Essex County Farm Bureau, the group visited farms throughout Essex County and witnessed the destruction wrought by the borer.

Essex County formerly raised 100,000 acres of corn which has now dwindled down to less than 30,000 acres. In 1922, there was only a slight infestation over the county. In 1925, the crop was practically a total loss from the ravages of the borer.

Primary Room

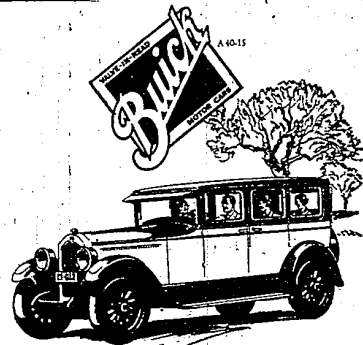
We had our local achievement day May 3, for the girls clothing project. The County achievement day will be held Saturday where we will take our things to be judged.
