On Friday, May 13, the Farmington High School team met the Northville team at Northville and was defeated 8 to 7, Northville winning only in the last half of the seventh inning.

The first inning was all Farmington. The local team, by dint of many errors by the Northville team and timely hitting by Farmington, were able to score five runs and Northville was blanked.

In the next inning, two more runs were scored by the local team and the game seemed "on the ice."

In the last few innings, the Northville team seemed to have the luck that Farmington had in the early part of the game and won out by the one run, scoring that in the last inning after two were out.

The story of that fatal inning was as follows:
The first batsman was safe on error by the Farmington shortstop. The next man singled cleanly, scoring his teammate, who had meanwhile stolen second, and went to second on the throw-in. The next two men flied out, one to the second baseman and one to the center fielder. After the following batsman had struck out the catcher dropped the ball allowing him to reach first safely. The last batter hit to the third baseman and the runner on third beat the throw home, ending the game.
