**CITY COMMISSION WILL SECURE ENGINEER TO SET STREET GRADES**

Preliminary steps toward the establishing of street grades in Farmington were taken by the city commission at its meeting last Friday night. As the result of an inquiry from a citizen regarding the street grade in front of a home he is building, the commission considers it advisable to have the street grades established in order that builders may be guided in erecting structures.

Mayor Butterfield, after the commission voted to authorize him to appoint a committee to secure an engineer, appointed Commissioners Hogle and Johnson to secure an engineer's services. It is not likely that an engineer will be engaged for continuous service, but at present only for the purpose of having the street grades established.

Dr. J. A. Miller was chosen health officer of the city for the ensuing year by a vote of the city commission.

The paving ordinance prepared by Judge John J. Schulte was referred to Commissioners Hogle and Johnson, who will work with Judge Schulte in condensing the ordinance and checking it with the provisions of the city charter.

**To Build Booth**

Commissioner Gildemeister reported that he had authorized Arthur Lamb to proceed with the construction of a police booth on Grand River avenue for the sum of \$400. The police commissioner was empowered to appoint a temporary police officer if he considered it necessary to the best interests of the city to do so.

**CORNERSTONE LAYING AT EVANGELICAL CHURCH**

(Continued from page 1) North America. The pastors from 1830 up to the present time were: Rev. Schmidt, H. F. Gregorius, E. G. Aldinger, F. Mayer, H. F. Schuarschmidt, L. Kollbring, L. Groos, W. Wildi, and the present pastor, J. Bollens.

The following are the members of the official board: President, Fred Baumann; secretary, Carl Bechard; treasurer, Louis Gildemeister; trustees, Carl Westphal, Louis Holz, and John Landau. They have a membership of forty-seven.

They have tried several times to raise money to build a church but for some reason had failed, but when Mr. Bollens took the matter in hand there was no such thing as fail, and on October 27, 1901, Ch. Fendt, Wm. Mans, and Rev. Bollens were appointed as a committee to see what amount of money could be raised among the outsiders. By their efforts they realized about \$400 in subscriptions, and on November 10, it was decided to build a church.

Fred Baumann, Ch. Fendt, Wm. Mans, Carl Westphal, L. Gildemeister and Christ Schmidt were appointed as a building committee, and it was left in the hands of the architect, George P. Moog of Delray, to draw up the plans.

January 25, 1902 the plans of the foundation were let to John Habermehl and Steve Douraw.

On April 4, a big mass meeting was held when it was decided to build a brick church to cost about \$4,500, and the contract was let to Amos Otis of Detroit.

The young people have subscribed \$100 for an altar and pulpit, while the Ladies' Aid Society have paid \$300 for the lot and will see to the furnishings of the inside of the church. The members of the congregation have subscribed \$2,000, while altogether \$2,600 has been pledged.

All the church papers published with the official calendar of the Synod and church records and history, the picture of their president, Fred Baumann, and the last issue of The Farmington Enterprise, were deposited in a tin box and placed in the cornerstone. The stone was then lowered to its position on the foundation and an altar was pronounced a benediction upon it and Mr. Bollens made the closing prayer. Thus ended a day which will long be remembered by the people of Farmington.

The Ladies' Aid Society served supper to about four hundred people and realized the neat little sum of \$65.

Edgar Pierce, cashier of the Farmington State Savings Bank spent a pleasant afternoon golfing at Meadowbrook Wednesday. With Mr. Pierce were Dr. Z. R. Aschenbrenner and Harley Warner, who according to Mr. Pierce, found the afternoon less pleasant. Mr. Pierce as the winner after 20 holes had been played.
