Poulenc: Contemporary, Conservative, Vulgar

It's almost mandatory, these days, to schedule a modern work on the concert program. "After an all-Beethoven program once," says Wayne Dunghen, Plymouth Symphony conductor, "I had a woman who likes Beethoven say she missed having a modern composer on the program."

The modern in this Sunday's program, which begins at 4p.m. in Plymouth High School, will be Francis Poulenc (1899-

1963).
But Poulenc is a "conservative" modern; according to one of the men who will perform.

HE IS planist Alpa Shaffer, who will be heard in "Aubade, Choreographic Oncerto for Piano and its Instrument," which provides the contemporary, but its contemporary, but the consent jar me, it's traditional and conservative compared to pieces written even 10 or 20 years before," says Shaffer. "Aubade" is a term that means "morning music" in the sense of a morning concert.

sense of a morning concert. But it has also come to mean outdoor music, and that applies

to the Poulenc "Aubade,"
Shaffer went on.
"Poulenc had a lot of wealthy friends and wrote many
works on commission for prirute performances before the
public performances," he said.
This Aubade was written as
a ballet score for performance
in a Parisian mansion. The
story line is that the goddess
Dlana rebels against a divine
law that has condemned her to
eternal purity. Five of the eight
dances will be played in Sunday's concert. day's concert.

DESPITE ITS conservatism

DESPITE ITS conservatism in contemporary terms, the Auhade has a few surprises. "One of the middle sections," Olane et Compagnes," Is almost bonky-tonk; the rhythm is more excited. It's almost obscene (in a musical sense) I tlunk," says Shaffer.



BRUSH SPENDERS

The spontaneous charm of untrained early American ar-lists is evident in family por-taits, still lifes, and nautical scenes making up "101 American Primitive Watercolors and Passels," which opens at the Detroit Institute of Arts Tues-day, Oct. 15,

Selections are from more than 1,000 primitive paintings owned by Edgar William and Bernice Chrysler Garbisch, In 1964 Detroit Institute of Arts visitors saw 101 oil paintings from the same collection.

Mrs. Garbisch is the daughter of the late Watter P. Chrysler. She and Colonel Garbisch were among the first collectors to search out prime examples of this native American art.

HISTORICALLY, the coming exhibition of watercolors may be compared to letters and diaries of their time (1770-1850) while the oil paintings are the more formal memoirs and biographies. The loan show will last through Nov. 10.

Simplicity and sincerity, homespun beauty and decorative qualities, exert an irresistible appeal. These upsophisticated masterpleces thus offer a unique and intimate look at the way Americans lived when the nation was young.

Creators of the watercolors and pastels were usually full-time portrait painters, Penus sylvania German Fraktur ar-sylvania German Fraktur ar-tists or amateurs (of whom seminary schoolgirls were the most prolific). There was more paintings per capita done at that time than at any other period in the history of the

Demand for family likeness-es became so great that a new breed of self-taught, full time reprimitives* arose to meet the need. Some of the portraits are embellished with jewelry cut out of gold paper.
