### MY CONCERN

Nationally, crime is growing eight times faster than our population.

Approximately 90 per-cent of major crimes (felonies) are committed by persons who previously committed misdemeanors (lesser crimes).

Yet 95 per cent of our courts which handle misdemeanors have no meaningful probation-rehabilitation program.

Thus, with no intelligent or firm at-tempt to teach and rehabilitate persons committing minor crimes, they continue with their rebellious ttitudes and eventually commit felonies.

The Farmington Community has no worthwhile probation program. In-action and complacency is only en-couraging crime - not combating it.

The vast majority of our citizens re-spect the law and the rights of others and are concerned about the increasing disrespect for law and



### MY ANSWER

I believe that justice as well as charity must begin at home.

We must reverse this rising crime rate at the local level where concerned and dedicated citizens can help re-habilitate law violators before they become habitual criminals.

Our new District Court must have a concerned judge who will take the initiative and vigorously establish a probation-rehabilitation program similar to the nationally-acclaimed Royal Oak program which has enlisted the aid of citizen-volunteers.

We are blessed with many solid citizens in our community who could enrich their lives by guiding the life of a less fortunate individual.

I strongly urge the creation of a vol-unteer citizen staffed probation-re-habilitation department in our new District Court as a vital means of combating the causes of crimes and disrespect for law and authority.
