Accidents Injure 3

Three persons, one from Farmington, were injured last week in separate accidents on I-696 in Farmington Township.

Jacqueline M. Hedson, of 38080 12 Mile Rd., Farmington Township, was in fair condition early in the week at Botsford General Hospital following a three-car chain reaction accident at I-696 and Orchard Lake Rd. Oct. 6.

The driver collided with another car driven by a Southfield woman at the Orchard Lake entrance ramp to the east-bound expressway, police said. Edna Grace Jackson, of Southfield, was in fair condition at Harper Hospital, authorities said.

The driver of the third car, David M. Sabaroff, of Detroit, failed to stop in the assured distance and struck the Southfield woman's car which struck the Hedson car, police said.

In another I-696 accident Oct. 6, E. D. Keith, of Detroit, was injured at 1:50 p.m. when his car crossed the median west of Inkster Rd. and struck a Detroit woman's car, police said.

Keith told police a trailer he was pulling had swayed causing him to lose control of his car.

Keith and the driver of the other car, Vivian A. Kirchoff, were treated and released at Botsford General Hospital.

'I Can't Write' Soldier Tells His Pen Pals

Farmington friends of Tom Ryan shouldn't expect to hear from him for a while. He's in an Army hospital on Okinawa.

Spec. 5 Thomas W. Ryan, son of Mr. and Mrs. Harry Ryan, 21355 Farmington Rd., Farmington, doesn't seem to be as concerned about the injuries he received to his right arm and leg during combat in Vietnam as he is about the fact that his friends back here might quit writing if they don't hear from him.

At the moment, Ryan is undergoing physical therapy on his arm and leg in the hospital. He was taken to Okinawa from Quang Tri in the Demilitarized Zone of Vietnam where he was injured while sleeping in a tent that was hit by rocket attack.

Ryan's new address till his recovery is complete is US 5146510, US Army Hospital, Okinawa, APO San Francisco, 96331.

He hopes his friends will keep those letters coming until he is able to answer them, he'd especially like to hear from any

of the teachers he had at Farmington High.

Ryan's mother has more than her share of sons to worry about.

Another son, Sgt. Randall Ryan, just returned from a year in Vietnam, and her third son, Edward, just graduated from Farmington High, has been classified I-A.

MY CONCERN

Nationally, crime is growing eight times faster than our population.

Approximately 90 per cent of major crimes (felonies) are committed by persons who previously committed misdemeanors (lesser crimes).

Yet 95 per cent of our courts which handle misdemeanors have no meaningful probation-rehabilitation program.

Thus, with no intelligent or firm attempt to teach and rehabilitate persons committing minor crimes, they continue with their rebellious attitudes and eventually commit felonies.

The Farmington Community has no worthwhile probation program. Inaction and complacency is only encouraging crime - not combating it.

The vast majority of our citizens respect the law and the rights of others and are concerned about the increasing disrespect for law and authority.

MY ANSWER

I believe that justice as well as charity must begin at home.

We must reverse this rising crime rate at the local level where concerned and dedicated citizens can help rehabilitate law violators before they become habitual criminals.

Our new District Court must have a concerned judge who will take the initiative and vigorously establish a probation-rehabilitation program similar to the nationally-acclaimed Royal Oak program which has enlisted the aid of citizen-volunteers.

We are blessed with many solid citizens in our community who could enrich their lives by guiding the life of a less fortunate individual.

I strongly urge the creation of a volunteer citizen staffed probation-rehabilitation department in our new District Court as a vital means of combating the causes of crimes and disrespect for law and authority.
