Farmington Gave Two Of Her Son As Sacrifice In Great War

Two Farmington boys killed in action in the Great War, are among the nation's heroes whose memories will be honored on Memorial Day. Already their memories have been perpetuated by the local American Legion post, named "Groves-Walker Post," in their honor.

The dire tragedy of war first came home to Farmington when advice was received that Burtraw W. Groves, who was born in Farmington, and who enlisted ten days after war was declared by the United States, had been killed in action. Groves, still in his teens, was a member of the famous Michigan "Red Arrow" Division.

Body Lies Here

Groves served with Company A, Thirty-first Michigan Infantry. He was killed in battle near Fismes on August 6, 1918, about fifteen months after he had enlisted. His body was buried in France. Later, however, it was brought back to this country and interred at Oakwood Cemetery in Farmington. His grave will be decorated by his former comrades Monday morning.

The second Farmington boy to pay the supreme price was Lemuel Walker, who went to France in the same regiment, the 125th Infantry. After leaving Camp Custer, he became a member of the machine-gun company of the 125th Infantry.

Walker was 21 when he went overseas as a member of the "squad" of the 125th. He was among those who gave their lives just a few days before peace settled over Europe. In the autumn of 1918, near Gesnes, Walker was killed in action. The Armistice came a few days later.

Walker's body still lies in France, among America's thousands of honored dead. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Samuel Walker, live on Base Line road near Farmington.

Other Farmington boys who belonged to the famous "Red Arrow" Division, and who have returned to live in or near the town are Carl Goers, Howard G. Eisenlord, Hugo Schaepeter, Joseph De Vrient, Norman Lee, and Nye Humphrey. They will pay tribute Monday to the memory of their comrades who have answered the final bugle call.

FARMINGTON AMERICAN LEGION WAS ESTABLISHED FIVE YEARS AGO

Remembrance of Farmington's part in the World War is being perpetuated in the work of Groves-Walker Post, No. 346, American Legion, an active organization with an unusually large membership for the size of the city. More than forty men who served in the Great War are members of the Farmington post. The Farmington post was organized in the summer of 1922, with 15 charter members. They met first in the room over the waterworks, and then in the basement of the Farmington State Savings Bank building.

In 1924, after the centennial celebration of the city, the log cabin on Grand River avenue was devoted to their use. The Legion gratefully acknowledges the interest of the community in the post's welfare, for Groves-Walker

post has paid not one penny of rent for quarters in the five years since the post was organized.

Howard G. Eisenlord was elected the first commander of the post, followed by Mark B. Owen, Carl Goers, Carl Hoyle, and the present commander, Fred Maas. The Legion meets regularly in the log cabin on the first and third Thursday nights of each month.

Fund Started

Some time ago, a building fund was started. The log cabin has been found rather small to house the activities of the post.

Through hard work and continuous effort, aided by the co-operation of the community, the Legion has raised a neat sum which will be a start toward the building they hope to be able to erect in the not far distant future.

LABOR DAY LEGION'S BIG EVENT

The big event of each year for the Farmington American Legion group, Groves-Walker post, No. 346, is also the "big day of the year" for the city of Farmington. Labor Day of each year in Farmington has come to be recognized as "Gala Day," not only for the American Legion, but for all the people of the section. On that day, the city is literally "turned over" to the Legion boys, and they "make the welkin ring."

"Gala Day" takes the place of

the circus, the field day, and the "homecoming" events of other towns, for Farmington. Former residents return to greet their friends, and the entire countryside turns toward Farmington.

It is a little early in the year for the formation of detailed plans for the coming Gala Day, the Legionnaires say, but they are looking forward to a day no less colorful and enjoyable than the celebrations in years gone by.
