Those who were vaccinated either never contracted the disease or had it in very mild form, these assertions can be verified by Board of Health of Detroit.

"Two Cases In Pontiac "Two Cases In Pontiac "Last week Pontiac reported two cases of smallpox and neither of these cases had been vaccinated. Vaccination is the one measure which we all can take against the disease and protect ourselves, the community and the business interests of this city. "The health officer will be pleas-to furnsh free vaccine to all physicians of the City and will gladly co-operate with them in every way so as this general vaccination plan can be fully carried out as advised by the Department, and to you all of the City wask your hearty support in protecting your children, yourselves, home and city.

Smallpox Contagious

Wholesale vaccination is recognized as the only known and positive method to prevent smallpox. The disease is very contagious. Persons who are exposed are almost sure to develop it if they have not heen vaccinated. On the other hand, those who have had this treatment, fairly recently, mingle freely with patients in hospitals and elsewhere, and do not get the disease.

In countries where vaccination is not used, smallpox is still one of the main causes of death—China, India, and Russia. On the other hand, Japan stamped out the disease by compulsory vaccination throughout her islands. In England, babies must be vaccinated before they are six months old.

Some people are afraid of vaccination, thinking it dangerous.
This is a mistake. Performed by a physician who is clean in his methods, it is entirely safe. Formerly, there was possible danger of some infection in the vaccine. For this reason its production and sale has been, since 1902 under strict control of the Federal government.

With all precautions taken to insure safety, those people who reglect this protection are dangerous citizens. Their presence in the community, in any numbers, makes possible a severe outbreak of the disease. Smallpox would be banished from the world if everyone understood the importance of vaccination.
