OLD RESIDENT OF FARMINGTON DEAD OF HEART ATTACK

William McDermott Dies While Reading Newspaper in His Home

Last week end marked the passing of one of Farmington's oldest and best-known citizens, William McDermott, who died at his home on Shiawassee avenue at the age of 86. Funeral services were held in Clarenceville on Monday and burial was in Oakwood Cemetery.

Mr. McDermott apparently died while reading his newspaper early Friday evening. On Saturday morning he was found by occupants of another portion of the house, seated in his chair, with his eyeglasses lying on the paper in his lap. Death was caused by a heart attack.

Born in Southfield, Mr. McDermott had lived in Farmington 35 years. He was born in Southfield township on January 16, 1841, and married Miss Esther Thompson on June 1866. Mrs. McDermott died February 9, 1906.

Two sisters survive Mr. McDermott, Mrs. V. C. Lockwood of Clarenceville and Mrs. Ellen McHugh of Fenton, in addition to a niece, Miss Minnie Toomey of Farmington.

CLUB ASKS STATE PLANT MORE FISH IN WALLED LAKE

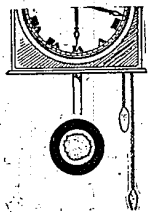
Exchange Group Applies To State Board For Bass and Blue-Gills

In the interest of good fishing in Walled Lake, and to maintain the reputation of the lake as a good place for fishing sport, the Walled Lake Exchange Club has made application to the State Conservation Department for a large quantity of bass and blue-gills.

The step taken by the Exchange Club is a far-sighted one, and it is expected that the Conservation Department will grant the request. Should the application be acted on favorably, it is likely that thousands of bass will be put in the lake next month, and an equally large number of blue-gills in September.

The fish put in for conservation purposes are "fry," tiny fish that require three years to grow to a size which the law requires for fishing. It is estimated that about 75 per cent of the fish placed in the lake would develop to maturity.
