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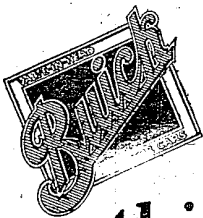

### DROWNINGS MAY BE AVOIDED BY STUDYING ADVICE ON BATHING

There is a deal of advice given each year as the bathing season approaches. Some of it is good, some of it not bad. There are two bits of advice, however, which are invariably good. One bit is this: If the day is warm, and you have been exercising violently, stay out of the water until you have had time to thoroughly cool off. Many apparent drownings are not strictly drownings but deaths induced by shock caused by the swimmer plunging into cold water when still heated from severe exertion.

The second rule is this: Never go into the water entirely alone. Have near at hand someone who can swim well, and who knows something about artificial respiration.

It is an "old saw" that the good riders are the ones who are dragged, the good swimmers are the ones who drown, and the good drivers are the ones who have smash-ups. There is more than a grain of truth in the "saw." The good riders and the good swimmers and the good drivers grow careless, inattentive, a bit too sure of themselves, and

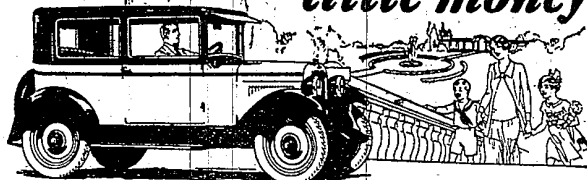
then something unexpected happens. And the following day the newspapers carry big headlines telling about the tragedy.

So with swimming. Distance swimmers should always be accompanied by a boat. Beach swimmers should not go in alone. A fond mother, sitting on shore fully dressed, with shoes on, and unable to swim, might as well be at a matinee, for all she may be able to do in case of emergency. In case of drowning, send for a doctor at once. Until he comes use artificial respiration. Even though the patient may have been in the water for some time, do not give up. Continue artificial respiration until heartbeating is restored or the doctor himself loses hope.

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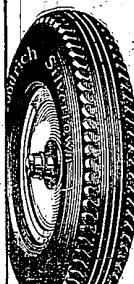
