GATES CEMENT BLOCK PLANT TREBLES ITS PRODUCTION CAPACITY

A business growth that shows the steady development of this section and is at the same time a tribute to the business ability of a woman, is that of the Gates Cement Block Plant, located on Grand River avenue, two miles west of Farmington.

Fourteen years ago, a modest cement-block business was begun in the basement of the spacious house on "Gates' Corner." A few days ago, there was installed in the Gates factory, machinery which gives the Gates plant a production capacity of 1,000 cement blocks per day, probably the greatest in this section.

"The new machinery will multiply our capacity three times," Mrs. Gates said in discussing the growth of her business. "With this new equipment, we will be able to supply thousands of blocks on short notice."

The machinery installed at the Gates plant requires but the shifting of levers to turn out complete cement blocks after the concrete mixer has been filled. An endless conveyor carries the concrete to a magazine, which distributes the concrete to the mold. Power tamps pack the mixture, the surplus is stripped from the top, the blocks tamped with tremendous force and a complete, perfect block is lifted out. What was formerly an arduous task is done easily in a few seconds.

Sell Sand And Gravel

The Gates plant will continue to supply customers with sand and gravel from the Gates pit north of Gates corner. Further additions to the block-making plant and equipment will be made soon. Mrs. Gates believes that this section is on the verge of a great in-building development, with a big demand for building materials.

"We have no hesitancy in investing in new machinery," Mrs. Gates said. "Our faith in this section's future has increased every year as we have seen our own business grow."

The Twin Cities, sister ship of the Twin Ports which last week started regular service from Detroit to New York, trans-shipping there to world ports, arrived at Detroit Railway and Harbor Terminals June 14 with general cargo for Terminals and Transportation, the new \$20,000,000 corporation which owns the fleet. At the same time the Twin Cities arrived here after a passage of five days, 16 hours, word was received that the Twin Ports reached New York with heavy export shipments from Dodge Brothers and Ford Motor Company.

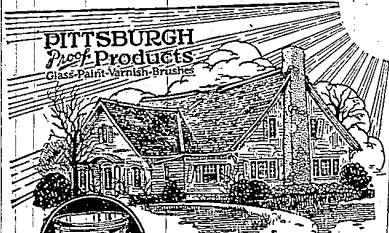
