BOIL CITY WATER IS ADVICE FROM **HEALTH OFFICER**

City Water Absolutely Pure At Source, But Contamination Found In Mains

A recent test of Farmington' water made at the State Labora-tory at Lansing from samples of water taken as required for the purpose of analysis, shows that the water at source of supply is absolutely pure and free from all forms of contamination. All sam-nes taken from hydrants in yaforms of contamination. All samples taken from hydrants in va-rious locations in the city proved equally free from i dangerous germs with the exception of sam-nets taken from mains on Farm-ington road and Power avenue, which showed a slight contamina-tion in the presence of a germ of the coil group of the baccillus, but no typhoid germ. The bac-cillus found is liable to cause in-testinal disorders and for that reason Dr. J. A. Miller, city health officer advises the boiling of the city water for domestic purposes. LARGE GATHERINGS Held

Dr. Miller does not consider the condition of the water as dan-gerous, but deems it wise to use caution. The fact that the water at its source is uncontamniated renders the chances of an epi-demic as remote. Just how the germs got into the Powers and Farmington road mains is not known, but they may, have been in some of the 'dead ends' which existed before the system was re-constructed two years ago. Mains Flushed As a matter of precaution the mains have been flushed at all hy-drants in the city and all dead water removed, yet in o chance at its source is uncontamniated

water removed, yet no chance should be taken until a report is made showing the water to be absolutely free from dangerous rerms

July 11, 1927 Dr. J. A. Miller, Health Officer, Farmington, Michigan Dear Doctor: We are enclosing a report on three samples of water collected by you on July 7 from public numbers 1, 2, and 5. Samples 1 and 2 show evidence of denserval contemination.

Samples 1 and 2 show evidence of dangerous contamination. We safe for drinking or domestic use. Sample No. 5 shows no evidence of dangerous contamination.
