in Train Dispatching The use of the telephone instea of the telegraph for dispatching trains has become almost general in this country because of the advantages the new system offers over the old. The information is handled in less time, less training is required to handle the telephone efficiently, to handle the telephone efficiently, there is less physical and mental strain on the dispatchers in making the calls, and operators who have become incapacitated as good tele-graph. operators are still able to handle the business efficiently by telephone. In the event of emer-gencies in train operation, the train conductor or engine man, using a way station or portable. telephone, can give first aid information to the dispatcher as uper intendent more can give first aid information to the dispatcher or superintendent more intelligently, with less excitoment and in less time than with the tele-graph. There is more of a personal feeling and better esprit de corps developed between the dispatchers, the different operators and the train crews than is possible with the tele-graph, with obvious results. On account of the increased effi-ciency and greater ease in handling

cance and greater case in handling train operations with the telephone, it is possible for a dispatcher to handle a longer stretch of railroad than with the telegraph with little or no increased effort.
