

BRITAIN ENVOIOUS OF AMERICAN TELEPHONES

The telephone service in Great Britain has failed to satisfy some of the more progressive Britishers, judging from the frequent complaints in English newspapers and the fact that a private organization has been actively agitating for a more widespread use of the telephone. The Manchester "Daily Dispatch" recently estimated that "the total number of stations in the Post Office system is roughly 1,500,000." That is, that in the whole of Great Britain there are fewer telephones than in New York State, which has two and a half million. The same article in the "Dispatch" goes on to say: "The telephone (in England) is still regarded as a luxury in almost out of every town private houses. It ought to be a necessity. We need the telephone habit. America has it, even to the remotest outlying farmsteads." The "Dispatch" might have added that telephones in farmhouses are almost unknown, outside of Canada and the United States.

Home Makers' Column

Few people realize the diversity of uses possible with cottage cheese. It is high in nutritive value, containing some of all the constituents of milk except the butterfat, according to the United States Department of Agriculture. Like milk, it is a source of protein, which is used to build and repair body tissue. In salads, dips, soups, or cooked dishes, cottage cheese may be used to advantage and also as a basis for the main dish of a meal. Most people like plain uncultured cottage cheese. It is especially pleasing in summer, and when blended with rich cream and a little salt it is enjoyed by many. It is often eaten with sugar and cream. When cream is lacking whole milk is used to moisten the cheese and sugar. Not only sweet cream, but sour cream or melted butter added to cottage cheese improves its flavor and increases the food value. Cottage cheese combines nicely with other things that give variety of flavor. Berries, peaches, or other fresh fruits may be used in this way; also canned fruits, raisins, cut dates, or other fruits, brown sugar, honey, jam or marmalade or chopped nuts. Broken nut meats, chopped pimentos, finely cut green peppers, diced olives, and other crisp vegetables may also be mixed with the cheese. Horseradish, onion juice, and parsley make a good combination. Cottage cheese may be seasoned well, packed into a buttered earthen or enamel dish, chilled, turned over on a platter and served in slices. Ground sage makes a good seasoning. Mix with the cheese a small quantity of finely ground left over ham or corned beef and season the whole with mustard. Serve in slices or turn out the molded cheese on a border of lettuce leaves.

BOYS' CAMP SITES ARE BEING PROVIDED IN THE MICHIGAN STATE PARKS

The park department of the Michigan Department of Conservation will begin the immediate construction of buildings in a number of the State parks for the accommodation of groups of boy campers who may desire to use such camp sites during the coming summer. Inasmuch as the State wishes to provide facilities only as rapidly as a need for them is evidenced, the program for this summer in the camps chosen will include the grading of camp sites, the building of a 30x45 combination kitchen, mess hall and recreation hall, the provision of sanitary conveniences, a well, an auxiliary outside kitchen and the necessary lighting. This layout will be completed in the following camps so that groups of boys may take advantage of the opportunity offered from July 1 on: Rockwood State Park near Detroit. Dodge Brothers State Park No. 10 near Highland in Detroit. Cedar Hills State Park (Wannler Lake) near Adrian. Bay City State Park near Bay City. Orchard Beach State Park near Manistee. Interlocken State Park near Traverse City. Marquette State Park near Marquette. It is planned to increase the number and improve the camp sites as interest in particular camps is manifested. Groups from any organization or community may therefore secure use, without charge, of any of these camp sites and the buildings thereon by notifying the park warden in advance of the date of their arrival. Such groups will of necessity provide their own tents, bedding, mess kits, and food. Stoves and large cooking utensils are on hand at the camps. All groups must be under the supervision of an adult who is recommended or approved by the Recreational Chamber of Commerce, Boy Scout Council or similar organization. It is to be hoped that a number of groups from your community will take advantage of this opportunity to get into the out-of-door life under the fine conditions surrounding the Michigan State parks.

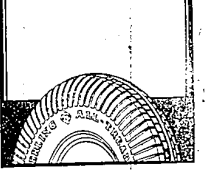

Breakfast menu when you have overnight guests: Canteen waffles and butter and bacon; maple syrup, strawberry preserves, or blackberry jam; milk or coffee. To shorten a pattern for a small person, fold a tuck in it half way between the armhole and the waist line, and another tuck half way between the waist line and the bottom. 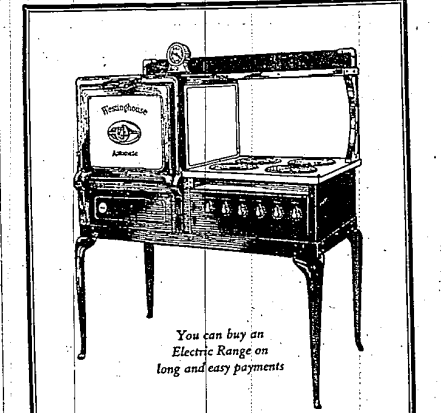
