Ann Sellock, the new bowling queen will be bowling with Farm Maid and will make a strong bid for the singles and all-events titles.

ALTHOUGH the season is not quite completed the Stroh team, champion of the All-Star Classic, that appears in Observant throughout the year, has made a switch in its lineup for next year.

Dale Seavoy, the slender pin toppler, who quit the team three years ago to join the pro tour, is returning to replace Jack Born.

Born, who recently purchased Northville Lanes, resigned to give more time to his business.

FRED VITALI, who is enjoying a high scoring spree in the late stages of the season fired another 700 series during the week.

Competing in the Westland Classic he linked games of 227, 235 and 256 for a 718 and beat out Bob Benson by 18 pins.

Benson tried hard to overtake him, but even a closing game of 266 wasn't enough.

Fred Ringrose was well on his way to top Tim with

games of 236 and 259. He dropped to 200 in the final and had to be content with 695 and third place.

FOUR OTHER 700s were registered during the week. Two came in the Garden Classic and the other two at Bel-Aire Lanes.

Bowling in the Classic at Garden Lanes, Bob Voss set the pace for the area with a 789 count on games of 290, 254 and 245, while Jim Lloyd had a 798 in 742 to pace the Senior House League.

At Bel-Aire, Vito Petru opened with a 267 for a 708 and Bill Kempton added a 702. Other high scores at Bel-Aire included Tom Schren with 288 in 691, and Paul Katas with a 268 in 699.

JACK BROWN is well on his way to establishing some sort of record in the suburban classic leagues.

Waterford Ends Falcon Streak

Well, it was, for the Farmington high baseball team.

The Falcons won their first four league and five straight games, by one-run margins.

They added to their streak by allying Pontiac Northern, 3-2, to take sole possession of first place in the Inter-Lakes Conference.

But Waterford turned the tables, stopping the streak with a 3-1 verdict, and also tied Farmington for the league lead—each with a 3-1 record.

JOHN FLEMING, a senior right-hander posted his fourth win of the season and third in league play in the victory over Pontiac Northern.

He allowed four hits, struck out seven and walked one.

It wasn't until the fifth inning that the Falcons broke into the scoring column when John Holappa, who bagged three hits, tripled and scored on Ray Ponke's sacrifice fly.

In the sixth, Randy Eckert, who was safe on an error, went to second on a stolen base, to third on a passed ball and scored on Paul Kupferschmidt's sacrifice fly.

Then Holappa's double, an error and Mike Flynn's sacrifice fly produced what proved the winning run in the seventh.

PONTIAC NORTHERN gave Fleming and Farmington a scare in the bottom of the seventh, loading the bases, scoring one run and seeing the count go to three-and-two on the final batter before Fleming struck him out.

Tom Hegan was the losing pitcher against Waterford, although he allowed five hits and fanned nine. Randy Bonneau, the winner, was touched for four hits.

Farmington's only run came in the fourth when Ponke, Tony Wenson and Eckerman singled to tie the score at 1-1.

It remained that way until the seventh when Rick Weaver singled and then was forced at second by Bonneau. Bonneau went to second on a sacrifice fly and wheeled the rest of the way with the winning run on Dennis Eagles' single.
