COUNTY TUBERCULOSIS ASSOCIATION TO HAVE A STATION AT FAIR

The Oakland County Tuberculosis Association with the co-operation of the Oakland County Department of Health, have completed plans with the board of managers of the Oakland County fair to conduct a health service station on the fair grounds this year during the County Fair to be held at Milford from the 17 to the 20 of August. Co-operation of those attending the fair is urged for important health project. Ten chest examinations were arranged for at the 1926 fair, 2,000 pieces of literature were given out to people who visited the health centre, a number of children and adults were weighed and measured and general care discussed.

Baby clinics will be conducted by the Oakland County Department of health this year and graduate registered nurses will be in attendance.

A large separate rest tent will be taken care of by the Monday Club of Milford, of which Mrs. Frank Ladd is president.

TWO NEW ADVERTISING SIGNS PLACED ON ROOF OF FARMINGTON MILLS

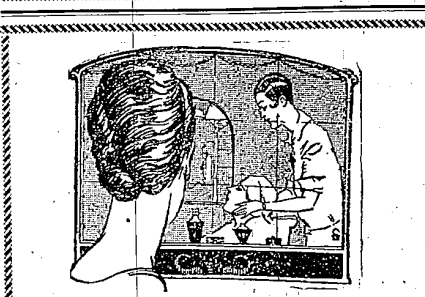

"OLD IRONSIDES" IS TO BE SHOWN NEXT WEEK AT DETROIT THEATRE

"Old Ironsides," Paramount's most ambitious production, will have its Detroit premiers at the New Detroit Opera House for a limited engagement commencing Sunday night, August 14, following its world premiere at the Rivoli Theatre, New York, last season. This picture has never been presented anywhere except in legitimate theatres, at legitimate prices.

Over two years ago Harry Carr, a newspaper man in Los Angeles, sensed the drama in the exploits of the U. S. S. Constitution and suggested this to Jesse Lasky.

It was necessary to build a whole small navy for the filming of the picture and "Old Ironsides" was reproduced from the original specifications into a modern seaworthy ship.

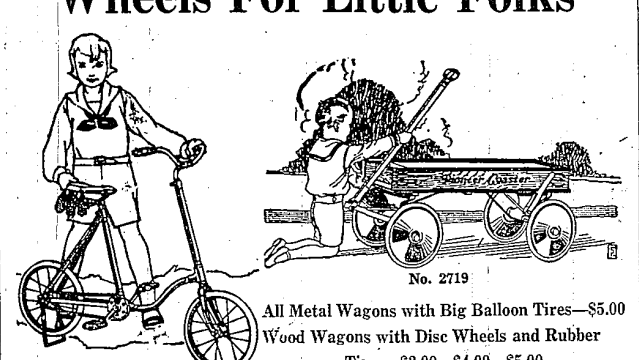
