

**CURIOS FROM ALL OVER AMERICA DISPLAYED BY CHAS. F. ROSE**

An exhibit that is probably unique in this section is the one which Charles F. Rose has recently moved from his home to his real estate office. It includes curios, stones, shells, and minerals and is probably the largest private collection of its kind in this vicinity.

The shells range from tiny ones to large conch-shells of every variety and shape. A large collection of starfish occupy nearly an entire shelf. Crabs, spawm from conch shells that look like sea serpents, coral, both of the sponge and tree variety in various shades and colors.

"Minnie balls" and lead bullets picked up on southern battlefields and forts and dug from trees on Lookout Mountain, are among the collection. Petrified wood from California and fossils of different shapes, moonstones and stones of every color picked up all over the United States, are objects of unusual interest.

Clock 200 Years Old

An old clock of at least 200 years of age, with the works made entirely of wood, occupies an important part in the collection

along with a watch charm of the same age.

Interesting vassils and pieces of wood from every corner of the globe. A bible published in 1829 a hymn book of the same age and an essay "on Man" published in 1818 are valued very highly. The collection of daguerreotypes is viewed as beyond price. Arrowheads, skinning stones, tomahawks, and other Indian weapons in a variety of shapes are displayed.

Practically the entire collection was made by Mr. Rose personally in his travels, which have taken him in practically every state in the Union and parts of Canada.

Visited Mines And Quarries

His collection of minerals, gold, silver, iron, copper, coal, zinc and lead were in the majority of instances taken from the mines and the marble directly from the quarries by Mr. Rose. Flint-lock gun old-fashioned pistols, swords, bayonets and bullets of various size, powder horns, coins, horns from buffalo, deer and Mountain goat are other items in the collection.

Listing the objects in detail would require great space. "Stop in and see the collection," is Mr. Rose's invitation to all.
