RECOMMENDATIONS ON CITY AFFAIRS MADE BY MAYOR

2. That the present cells are re-located in the East section of the city building and that they be equipped with running water and toilet. The work to be done under the direction of Supt. of Public Works, and to be done at an early date.

3. That a committee consisting of the Purchasing Agent, Fire Commissioner and Superintendent of Public Works be directed to submit at the regular meeting in October, an itemized statement and estimates of cost of fire apparatus, equipment, supplies, and repairs necessary to make the service efficient. First, for the city only; and second, for the city and adjacent township territory.

4. That a time clock be provided for the use of the night policeman or watchman, the same to be selected and purchased by Police Commissioner and Purchasing Agent.

5. That from this date no oil shall be used on the streets without the direction of the Commission and that after the present supply of oil is exhausted Sodium Chloride shall be used instead of oil.

6. That the Clerk be instructed to inform the County Drain Commissioner that in the matter of the Laing drain, the Commission favors direct assessment on territory directly benefited and tax on the city at large for the remainder of the apportionment.

7. That the Detroit-Edison Co. be requested to place a light on Farmington road between Oakland avenue and Shawwas road.

8. That clean-up day be set for the first week in November.

Wells D. Butterfield, Mayor. The recommendations were read late in the meeting, and no action was taken upon them, but it is expected they will be taken up in detail at later meetings.

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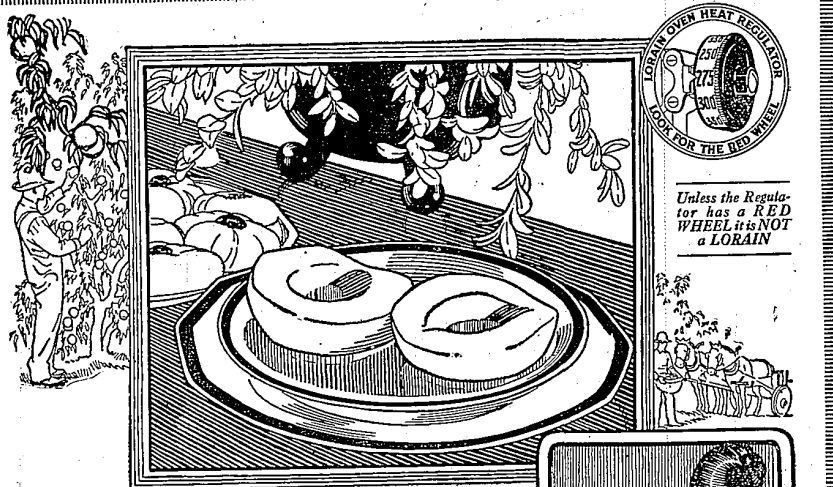
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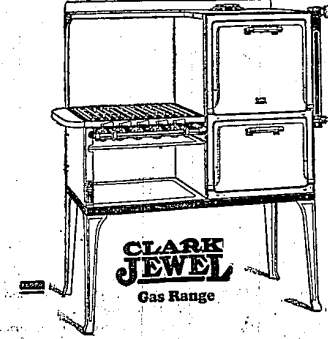
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
