Willis Brewer, Commander of the Michigan Department, American Legion was introduced by Legionaire Norman Lee and made a short address. Commander Brewer complimented the local legion post on its work in promoting the Gala Day events, and outlined some of the work of the Michigan posts, especially among 20,000 disabled veterans of the World War. Mr. Brewer's address in Farmington was among the last of his appearances before leaving for Paris on Wednesday, to attend the National Convention.

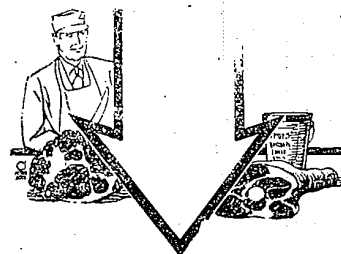
