JOHNSON PITCHES TWO WINNING BALL GAMES IN A DAY

West Point Park Hurlers Win Both Games Of A Double-Header Sunday

A new "iron man" among baseball pitchers in this section leaped into prominence last Sunday when George Johnson hurled West Point Park to victory in both games of a double-header at West Point Park last Sunday. Johnson pitched 14 innings of winning baseball, winning a tight battle, 2 to 1, in the closing game with Keego Harbor.

The Van Sickle Drug Company team of Detroit proved rather easy in the first contest. West Point Park winning, 9 to 3. Johnson kept the opposing team's hits well-scattered, and West Point Park displayed hard and timely hitting. The game lasted seven innings, and was halted to permit playing of the second game before dark.

Keego Harbor proved a worthier opponent in the final contest. West Point Park found the pitching puzzling, but Johnson held Keego Harbor in check throughout the game.

The opposing catcher plunked the ball into Hobbins' ribs and one rib was broken, the "tap" being blamed for the injury.

They have spent several winters in Florida. Mr. Dart driving six times over the road in their auto, three times in company with another car, all except one night, in a hotel and two nights in private homes.

One one trip they visited the Lincoln farm and log cabin, birthplace of Abraham Lincoln; also the prison grounds and cemetery at Andersonville, Ga.

The Lincoln cabin, is located twelve miles from Elizabethtown, Ky. It is protected by a marble memorial building built by public subscription.

The cornerstone of this building was laid by President Roosevelt February 12, 1909 and dedicated by President Taft November 11, 1911.

Caretaker At Prison

The government employs a superintendent to care for the Andersonville prison grounds. Mr. and Mrs. Dart drank from the cool soft spring water that providentially broke out in the prison grounds one night when Union soldiers were dying of thirst and hunger.

The cemetery grounds where 13,259 Union soldiers are buried are nicely kept, Mr. Dart said, and only 483 graves are marked unknown.
