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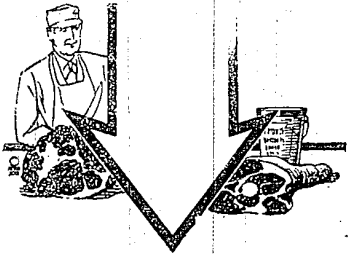

Peoples, cause her appearance to be entered in this cause within three months from the date of this order, and in case of her appearance that she cause her answer to the plaintiff's Bill of Complaint to be filed, and a copy thereof to be served upon the plaintiff's attorneys, within twenty days after service on her of a copy of said bill and notice of this Order, and that in default thereof that said Bill be taken as confessed by said non-resident defendant.

AND IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that within forty days after the date hereof, the said plaintiff cause a notice of this Order to be published in the Farmington Enterprise, a newspaper printed, published and circulating in said County of Oakland, and that such publication be continued once in each week for six successive

weeks, or that he cause a copy of this Order to be served personally on said non-resident defendant, at least twenty days before the time above prescribed for her appearance:

AND IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that the said plaintiff cause a copy of this Order to be mailed to said defendant at her last known postoffice address, by registered mail, and a return receipt demanded at least twenty days before the time herein prescribed for the appearance of the defendant.

TO HOLDERS OF SECOND LIBERTY LOAN 4 PER CENT BONDS

EXCHANGE OFFERING OF NEW TREASURY NOTES

Second Liberty Loan bonds have been called for payment on November 15th next, and no interest will be paid after that date. Notice of a new offering of United States Treasury notes, in exchange for Second Liberty Loan Government 4 per cent bonds, will be dated September 15, 1927, and will bear interest from that date at the rate of 4 1/2 per cent. The notes will mature in five years but may be called for redemption after three years. Interest on Second Liberty Loan Government 4 1/2 per cent bonds surrendered and accepted in exchange will be paid to November 15, 1927. The price of the new issue of notes, in 100% holders representing Second Liberty Loan Government 4 per cent bonds, will be \$100.00 at the time of delivery of the new notes, interest on such Second Liberty Loan Government 4 1/2 per cent bonds from May 15, 1927 to November 15, 1927, less the premium on the new notes issued. Holders of Second Liberty Loan Government 4 1/2 per cent bonds who desire to take advantage of this opportunity to obtain Treasury notes of the new issue should arrange with their bank to exchange at the earliest possible date, as this offer will remain open only for a limited period after September 15th.
