dally in the Soviet Union, Eastern Europe and around the two off, social studies in structors throughout Oakland County are being challenged to find new ways of teaching.

In many cases, textbooks are out and television, news magazines and satellite feeds are in.

television, news magazines are session-feeds are in. "There's no question there's been a tremendous impact," said Judith White, assistant superintendent for curriculum for the Farmington Public School Dis-trict. "They're tapling things right off of television, bringing in Newsweek.

In many cases, the textbook becomes almost secondary."

But instead of being concerned with outdated texts, curriculum directors for school districts are pleased with the changes because they are encouraging teachers to be less dependent on text-

teachers to be less dependent on the books.

Lesson plans could change overnight or even by the minute, offering teachers new challenges to the way they teach.

IN BIRMINGHAM schools, the district has a strategle plan calling for stepping up the curriculum review cycle, which is now about five to alx years, and adding more technology because of changes around the world, said Sylvia Whitmer, director of instruction.

Scaholm High School recently offered a

special day of choice classes to deal with these issues, and at Groves, teachers are dealing with the changing world through an integrated learning program.

White believes such integrated learning and more technology tools for the classroom will free teachers to do what they do best. "I contend that's what education is about in the 21st Century," she said. "If we don't keep up, we're dinosaurs."


Classroom teachers are facing the challenge of a changing world daily. Tom Latta, teacher and social studies chairman at Troy Athens High School said individual teachers handle current events issues as they arise and use "anything we can beg, borrow and steal" as teaching tools.

"It actually saves us," he said. "Tony Bennett may like to sing San Francisco over and over and over and over again, but we get tired of the same script." "These things really spark us up, We have to stay tuned in ourselves, which isn't always easy. But it's part of what we do."

David Harris, director of Social Studies for the Oakland Intermediate School District, said he is encouraged that teachers raise current topics in the classroom but is concerned it be done properly.

"We need to help teachers think more carefully so they make distinction between what is important and what is not," he Said.
