

## New Livonia AAUW Is Now Official Branch

A new Livonia branch of the American Association of University Women, just a dream three short months ago, now is fully organized with 33 charter members and a full board of officers. This branch came into existence officially when Mrs. John Lodge received a president's gavel during the recent Michigan AAUW Convention at Oakland University in Rochester. Serving with her on the first executive board will be Mrs.

John Van Wald, first vice president; Mrs. Norbert Laskowski, second vice president; Mrs. Robert Farmer, secretary; and Mrs. Thomas Marsh, treasurer. Installing the new officers at the state convention April 30 and May 1 was Mrs. George Timmons, president.

AN AAUW branch for Livonia has been a long-time hope of many women, though some residents of the big suburban city have joined branches in Plymouth and Farmington.

The first organizational meeting for a Livonia group was held in January, when 21 women met to explore possibilities.

Several were already members of the Farmington and Plymouth branches, and when the organization of the new group became official they held dual AAUW membership.

The new group, working with the experienced members, adopted a constitution and by-laws, appointed temporary officers and moved for state and national recognition.

DELEGATES to the state convention were Mrs. John van der Harst and Mrs. John Van Wald. Others in the branch who attended the convention were Mrs. R. M. Grinager of Farmington, Mrs. John Haas of Plymouth and Mrs. Arthur Medwedoff and Mrs. Owen Sudman of Livonia.

The next meeting of the new branch will be held in the home of Mrs. Gerald Burke, 1529 Richfield, Livonia, at 8 p.m. May 18. Mrs. Alex Mergantime, Detroit resident who is area representative on community problems for the Detroit branch, will be the speaker. The bride also is planning a tour of Detroit's inner city May 12. THE AAUW was founded in 1882 to open the doors of education to women, and to unite alumnae of different institutions for "practical educational work."

A legislative program, voted by members in convention, is actively studied and supported by individual members.
