below the state average. In the mathematics area, Farm-ington students averaged 533 com-pared with 519 statewide and 474 na-tionally. Farmington students had scored 522 on the SAT verbal in 1990 and 535 in 1989.

Total scores on the SAT - which

includes Both verbal and math added together — showed Farmington stu-denis averaging 597 compared with 980 statewide and 596 nationally, Students had scored 983 in 1950 and 971 in 1980. This also was an improvement from 1990, when Farmington fell be-low the state average scores.



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
