ITEM: Zoning Text Amendment 11, 1991
PLEASE TAKE NOTICE that the Farmington Hills City Council will give formal consideration to a proposed text amendment of the Farmington Hills City Code, Chapter 34, Zoning Chapter, Article XVIII, which amendment will amend Section 34-195 (a), to amend the Preamble for the Industrial Research Office zoning district. A summary of said amendment is as follows:
(a) The IRO Industrial research office districts are designed to provide for uses which are office or research type or industrial uses which have limited impact outside of the industrial building. The district is designed to be used in areas which are not adjacent to lands indicated as single-family residential on the city's Master Plan and is intended for use in that area of the city which is bounded on the north by the existing IRO district boundary as of January 1, 1992, on the east by Haled Road, and on the south generally by the Farmington Highway industrial Park. The district is intended to encourage uses which have a high value per acre of land that will supplement the city's tax base. Certain businesses are permitted within office buildings as secondary uses.
